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Among Orthodox Eastern Christians concentrated in the Byzantine Empire, belief in witchcraft was widely regarded as deisidaimonia — superstition —and by the 9th and 10th centuries in the Latin Christian West, belief in witchcraft had begun to be seen as heresy.

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Witchcraft and Sexual Deviancy. The belief in witches and witchcraft was exacerbated by the church, and local supervision. This was a phenomenon common to early Europe, so much so that there are known professional witch hunters, such as the German Heinrich Kramer (1430-1505) and Jacob Sprenger (1436-95).

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Throughout the medieval and early modern period, the orthodoxy of the Christian Church was continuously contested. The challenge of heterodoxy, especially as expressed in various kinds of heresy, magic and witchcraft, was constantly present during the period 1200-1650.
